Dartmouth of Yesterday

were several wigwams and huts in the Tufts Cove reservation until all were destroyed in the explosion of 1917.

Mic Mac Indians lived in Tufts Cove

For many years before 1917 there existed a Micmac Village at Tufts Cove, North Dartmouth. Just when the tribe settled there is hard to determine, although they must have been there before 1850. Wigwams and dwellings followed the shoreline from near Grove Street, outward to the Shannon Park Area.

They made a modest living by constructing sweetgrass baskets,

trinkets, moccasins and other items that they could trade with white population. Their food consisted of wild fowl, rabbits and the readily available fish. Also in the forest nearby, during the summertime, there was a variety of sweet berries.

Life, although hard in winter, must have been satisfactory and peaceful at least, until 1917, when the great explosion destroyed the entire set-

tlement killing many of the inhabitants including nine children in the Tufts Cove School. The surviving members of the band moved to Shubenacadie and never returned.

So ended the Micmac population in this area except for a few families South of Dartmouth. The last of whom is believed to have died a few years ago at her residence off Caldwell Road.

THE 1917 EXPLOSION

COMMEMORATION COMMITTEE

The first meeting of the Commemoration Committee was held on Wednesday, May 8, 1991 at 1200 at 1110 Rockcliffe Street, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

1. Mrs. Kitz welcomed members of the Committee and outlined the mandate as envisaged by Mayor Wallace in a letter to her. Some discussion on additional members resulted in the suggestion that Marilyn Gurney, Curator of the Maritime Command Museum and someone from the Africville Genealogical Society be invited to participate as members of the Committee.

2. (a) Miss Davidson suggested that since the City of Dartmouth played an essential role in the disaster, the Committee should be called "The 1917 Explosion Commemoration Committee."

(b) Mr. Julien noted that the Department of Indian Affairs had records dating back to 1917 and it was likely that information on the Tuft's Cove Reserve could be gleaned from these records.

(c) Mr. Moir suggested that a public meeting of the Committee should be held at least one year in advance so that the general public could be made aware of the event and their opinions solicited.

(d) Mr. Moir and Mrs. Kitz agreed to approach the Dartmouth and Halifax School Boards to seek advice on how they could become involved in the Commemoration..

3. Mr. Flemming volunteered to act as Secretary for the Committee and his offer was accepted by the members.

4. A general discussion on activities suggested by Lou Collins and by Alan Ruffman ensued. Among the activities suggested were a series of dramatic readings by Neptune Theater actors; a school essay contest; a walking tour of the north ends of Halifax and Dartmouth; exhibits at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic, the Maritime Command Museum, the Public Archives of Nova Scotia, and Saint Mary's University Art Gallery; a reception in Halifax Hall, a special 70th Anniversary brochure; various religious services; the preparation of a special map noting various explosion site and artifacts.

5. It was noted by many Committee members that certain aspects of the disaster should be developed in order that the Commemoration may be as wide as possible. This would involve a closer examination in the role of the police and fire departments, medical authorities women, children, Dartmouthians, blacks and Micmacs..

6. The Gorsebrook Institute of Atlantic Canada Studies has agreed to hold a symposium on the Explosion from December 3 to December 6. It was felt that at least two members of this Committee should be members of the Symposium Organizing Committee.

7. After some discussion it was agreed that a budget of \$1,500 be requested from the City of Halifax for the use of the Committee in its deliberations. It was agreed that the next meeting would be called after Mrs. Kitz had an opportunity to discuss the matters noted above with Mayor Wallace.

The meeting was adjourned.
