sidewalks, trails, bike lanes, crosswalks, etc. One of Council's biggest accomplishment in the last few months was the unanimous adoption of the Integrated Mobility Plan (IMP), which explicitly aims to reprioritize the users of our roads and put people first!

The IMP will change our transportation policies and drive the spending decisions over the coming years to focus on adding more sidewalks, more bike lanes, more trails, more marked crosswalks, dedicated bus lanes, bus rapid transit, and, hopefully, commuter rail.

This will be the second year for Participatory Budgeting in District 9. This is your chance to participate in deciding how District Capital Funds are spent in our community. There are more details on the amounts, process, and dates inside. I hope you come out to the information & planning session and the community vote.

FROG POND TRAIL GETS MUCH NEEDED MAINTENANCE



At the end of 2016, seven of the eight boardwalks around Frog Pond were identified as needing significant repairs, which ranged from partial replacements to completely new boardwalks. One had to be raised above the high-water mark. Some new crusher dust was added at multiple points along the trail. The work was completed in the Fall of 2017 and the trail will be good for years to come.

CANADA'S FIRST SEABIN IS HERE IN DISTRICT 9



The Seabin Project began in 2015 and the first one in Canada was recently installed at the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron thanks to the generous sponsorship of Butterfield Bank. I presented a Council scroll of congratulations to Ben Harris, VP of Planning & Analysis at Butterfield's office in Halifax. Ben is also a resident of District 9.

The Seabin is a floating garbage bin designed to be placed around docks, yacht clubs, and commercial ports as one part of the solution to the current global ocean trash problem. Water is syphoned in from the surface and passes through a catch bag inside the Seabin. The trash is later collected and disposed of properly.

POVERTY SOLUTIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE PRESENTED REPORT



I was pleased to fill in for the Mayor and co-chair at the final meeting of the Poverty Solutions Advisory Committee with Sara Napier of the United Way. Our report was presented to the Community Planning & Economic Development Committee of Council in March, with ambitious recommendations on enhancing transit, improving food security, and increasing affordable housing.

GET YOUR NEXT GENERATION WATER METER

After a successful small-scale deployment, Halifax Water began installations of advanced metering infrastructure (AMI) technology in September for all remaining customers and will continue over the next 3 years. About 84,000 state-of-the-art water meters will be installed as part of Customer Connect, an initiative to upgrade Halifax Water's technology to better serve customers, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and eventually allow for monthly billing.

PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING IN DISTRICT 9: BUILDING OUR COMMUNITY TOGETHER

Each district has a budget of \$94,000 in District Capital Funding annually that can be used to support important community projects. Requests for District Capital Funds must come from not for profit organizations, support initiatives that have community benefit and fall within HRM's mandate. Examples could be public art, bike racks, playground equipment, benches, or other community enhancements in your neighbourhood.

To involve residents in how some tax dollars are spent, I will be hosting Participatory Budgeting in District 9 for the second year. There are many benefits with Participatory Budgeting: it encourages great ideas to come forward from local groups and individuals; it builds community support and collaboration; and it gives local residents a direct say in how they want the District 9 Capital Funds to be spent.

NATURE CONSERVANCY OF CANADA AND HALIFAX WORKING TO CREATE NEW PARK

Last fall, Halifax Regional Council voted unanimously to move forward with a proposal by the Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) for a 379-acre urban wilderness park bordering the Purcell's Cove Backlands. The tentative agreement between the NCC, Halifax and the property owner, The Shaw Group, presents an extraordinary opportunity to conserve a rare landscape and habitat, while creating a park designed for outdoor recreation and nature appreciation, minutes from the urban core of the city. The project has already come a long way, but to make the park a reality, NCC will need wide support from the community.

The property includes Williams
Lake and Colpitt Lake and is already
a popular spot for swimming
and hiking. The Williams Lake
Conservation Company and members
of the Backlands Coalition have been
advocating for its protection for many
years and the Halifax Green Network
Plan consultations identified it as one
of the three areas for protection in
Halifax.

Once considered for a suburban housing project, this beautiful property should be conserved because it contains a rare forest type known as jack pine and broomcrowberry barrens, found only on exposed, glacier-scraped rock near the Atlantic coast. The property also includes sections of mature pine forest and many small wetlands, which provide habitat for more than 40 species of breeding birds and other wildlife.

The vision for the urban wilderness park is to conserve the ecology and landscape for both wildlife and people, so future generations will always be able to get outside and connect with nature. The park will be easily accessible by road and by public transit. Most trails will be marked but kept narrow and natural. Year-round low-impact activities such as hiking, birding, interpretive walks and outdoor education will be permitted. The lakes will be open for unsupervised swimming and non-motorized boating.

As Canada's largest charitable land trust, NCC has helped conserve 2.8 million acres of ecologically-significant land across Canada, including 33,000 acres in Nova Scotia. With 50 years of experience, the NCC recognizes the Backlands as a rare chance to conserve a significant and accessible natural landscape in an urban centre, in partnership with a willing land owner and a supportive municipal government.

To help create the park, the Nature Conservancy of Canada has committed to raising \$3.5 million from the community: \$2.5 million for a conservation agreement with Halifax ensuring no development or resource extraction can ever occur on the property; and \$1 million for legal and associated costs, including the establishment of a stewardship fund to ensure long-term care of the property, with land values appraised by professional, independent third parties.

Over the next year, NCC will be seeking financial support from a wide range partners, but particularly Nova Scotian businesses, local communities, and citizens of Halifax, to raise the necessary funds for this project.
